INVENTORY OF AMERICAN PAINTINGS EXECUTED BEFORE 1914

Buried in a remote corner of the National Collection of the Fine Arts is a treasure of information about American paintings. This is a computerized listing of works done previous to 1914; a listing gathered since 1970 by groups of dedicated volunteers throughout the nation. The Inventory of American Paintings Executed Before 1914 covers nearly 300,000 works in oil, water-color, tempera, fresco and pastel, either by Americans, or by painters documenting facets of American history. These paintings are located not only in museums and private collections, but are also from historical societies, public institutions, corporations, universities and many little known repositories.

As a simple nondiscrimative list of paintings it covers as a maximum the artist's name and life dates, title, medium, date, dimensions, name and address of the owner of the painting, identification and date of the source of information about the work, six subject classification terms, a single bibliographic citation, a single citation to a photographic reproduction, and an asterisk to signal researches that unpublished supplementary information is available in the Inventory's files.

Subject classification is in broad categories featuring definitions of formal imagery of interest to contemporary researchers in the history of American art and other fields of American history. A glossary to the classifications is available from the Inventory.

Identification of the date and source of information about the painting is a key element. Descriptions of the works come not only from the owners, but from catalogues raisonnes, exhibitions and sales catalogues, art periodicals and books, art and history museums and independent scholars.

A directory to the Inventory was published in 1976, listing the artists covered at that time, and also including a geographical listing of the collections recorded. About 1500 entries are at present from Texas collections, though many more are known but not recorded. Are the holdings in early American paintings in your institution represented in the Inventory?

CALL FOR PAPERS FOR JOINT ARLIS/CAA SESSION

On Wednesday afternoon, January 30, 1980, in New Orleans, the joint session of ARLIS/CAA will meet. The subject is Bibliographies on Iconography, with a special emphasis on non-Christian subjects. A differentiation will be made between the sources the artists knew or read and the tools we today use to discover the meaning of images. Each participant will need to bring enough copies of the bibliography to give the some 150 people who may be in the audience. Moreover, each participant will give a 15 to 20 minute slide presentation illuminating the subject of the bibliography without actually reading the material which will be distributed. Those wishing to be on the program should submit an abstract of the proposal and a vita, if at all possible, by the beginning of October to Dr. Lois Swan Jones, Art Department, North Texas State University, Denton, Texas 76203. All proposals will be judged by a committee for this session.


